Difficult Transitions . . .

Our TV reception difficulties were suppose to disappear and the picture was suppose to be amazing. Unfortunately, as with many transitions, our transfer from the analog system to the digital system came with many unforeseen problems. The least of the problems was that some 250 TV remote controls had to be re-programmed. Also, some areas of the campus needed amplifiers. We are sorry it took a while to clear up. We were also allowed to see the many makes and models of TV's on campus. A message channel is being worked on and should be in place soon. In a month or so we will review the channel selections again.

What's down there? . . .

Some of you had fun watching the large truck with its drilling device in front of the dining room. The work is part of the Geotechnical Engineering Investigation Report necessary for expanding our dining room. Several exploratory borings had to be completed within the site to evaluate the subsurface soil conditions. The exploratory borings advanced to depths ranging from approximately 15 to 50 feet. During the drilling operations, penetration tests were performed at regular intervals to evaluate soil consistency and to obtain information regarding the engineering properties of the subsoils. Soil samples are retained for laboratory testing. The soils encountered will be continuously examined and classified. This will in turn determine the depth of the cement pad and pillars for the new dining room.

Great News . . .

Sierra View Homes Care Center received a monetary grant as the Quality Assurance Supplemental Performance Award. For the past year, the Medi-Cal system looked at a number of qualifications such as turnover of personnel, infection rates, re-hospitalization and other quality indexes. "BY THEIR FRUITS YOU WILL RECOGNIZE THEM"

The last few weeks during devotions we have been working our way through the fruits of the Spirit as identified in Galatians 5:22-23: love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

I tie this passage to Jesus' words towards the end of the Sermon on the Mount: "by their fruits you will recognize them" (Matt 7:16). Talk is cheap, but the fruit does not lie. Belief is a hard thing to quantify or measure, but over the course of our lives, the fruit referenced in Galatians will either reveal itself or it will not, and the seriousness with which we take our faith will be reflected in that fruit.

This is initially quite overwhelming. None of us are on target with all the fruits of the Spirit all of the time, even on our good days. The good news is we have a few things going for us. First of all, as human beings uniquely created in the image of God, we all have natural gifts and strengths in particular fruits of the Spirit. When we gather together as believers we offer our gifts and are inspired and nourished by the gifts of others. As it says in Ecclesiastes, "Though one may be overpowered, two can defend themselves. A cord of three strands is not quickly broken."

(Ecclesiastes 4:12)

The second item of good news is that we believe in a God of grace. Even on the days we fail miserably at nurturing any of the fruits of the Spirit, we know we can always commit to doing better. There is no "leveling-up" when it comes to the fruits of the Spirit. One does not master love and move on to joy never to have to work on love again. Rather, being attentive to the fruits of the Spirit requires continual maintenance, correction, and self-reflection. And with our faith community and through the grace of God, we continue on this journey, that the light of Christ might be seen through us.
