One of the speakers, Terry Hershey, an Episcopalian Minister, writer and inspirational speaker, discussed the need to make time for "pause;" not just a once in awhile idea but a must for every day. Take time to enjoy, savor Gods gifts surrounding you; and allow God to talk to you.

Hershey goes on to say that we need to practice "the sacrament of the present moment" and rid our lives of the distractions. So many of us are on the go all the time. Abundance out of Scarcity . . .

We are not our best selves when we are convinced there is not enough to go around. Despite living in a culture of excess and abundance, fear abounds that what we have is not enough or that something out of our control might happen and leave us with nothing.

Our four gospel writers all share different stories and perspectives on the life of Jesus but one story they all made sure to tell was Jesus feeding the multitudes (in Mark he does it twice!). The disciples carry the anxiety that we so often do: "It's not going to be enough!" "Send some of them home!" Jesus responds by breaking the bread that was available and giving thanks.

We can debate exactly how many people were fed or how the food distribution worked, but the message we should come away with at the end of the day is that Jesus provides abundance out of scarcity. Let us put aside our worst tendencies to seek excess with the mentality of "me first" and instead seek to be content with the abundance of Christ, which seeks the good of the community and is achieved when *all* have enough.
