The theme that kept coming up throughout the story was integrity. We think of Joseph's rise to prominence, but we perhaps fail to recognize how rough Joseph had it for most of the story. Thrown in a well and sold into slavery by his own brothers, framed by Potiphar's wife and unjustly jailed, interprets the baker and cupbearer's dreams and is promptly *forgotten* in jail. All of these things are more than enough reason for a person to become bitter and decide to just look out for themselves.

And yet time and time again the scripture tells us that Joseph's character and trust in God allows him to rise above these obstacles and find favor with the right people in the right places. Like a bobbing apple that always rises back up to the surface, Joseph never gives up on God or people, and God never gives up on him. In the end Joseph finds himself at the top of the power structure with the opportunity to exact revenge on the brothers that traumatized him so, and once again finds the strength rise above their level and embrace them with open arms.

When we are hurt by life and people, and when misfortune seems to be the only theme in our story, may we draw strength from the story of Joseph, whose patient perseverance and faithfulness allowed him to thrive and be a blessing, despite it all.

Food and Nutrition . . .

Sierra View Homes has created a new position, The Food and Nutrition Director. Jesus Osorio, comes to us from Fresno's Armenian Home and he will be charged with overseeing the Dietary Department to ensure nutritious and appetizing entrees will be a constant in our food service. Jesus will manage the dietary team in providing the fortified three meals and nourishments each day. Brenda Soares is on an extended medical leave.

Jesus will co-chair with Maya (Administrator in Training) the Food as Medicine Committee so that our dietary offerings will be wholesome, appetizing and nourishing for all our residents. One of the reasons life expectancy has increased so much in the last fifty years is that we are more knowledgeable about the foods we should eat more of and the foods we should stay away from.

The Food as Medicine Committee Meeting meets every other month to review the menu and to determine if we can offer more plant based diets. A licensed dietician assists on the committee. It also looks at meals and refreshments that may interfere in better health. We are also attempting to follow residents personal wishes.

The Committee also determined that instead of offering an alternate that is too similar to the regular entrees, a wholesome salad with a protein will be offered.

The Food as Medicine Committee is not to be confused with the Food Committee that is resident based. The Food Committee meets and discussed presentation, taste and food preferences. We welcome Jesus to our Dietary team!
